About Place2Be's Children's Mental Health Week

Blue Whale and Tiger Class have been learning...

This week has been an exciting time learning about the traditions and customs surrounding Chinese New Year. They discovered how families prepare for the celebration by cleaning their homes to sweep away bad luck and decorating with red, which symbolizes good fortune. They also learned about the delicious foods eaten during the festivities, like dumplings, rice cakes, and sweet rice balls, each carrying special meanings for prosperity and happiness. As they delved deeper into the holiday's history, they were fascinated by the story of "The Great Race," which explains the order of the Chinese zodiac animals. From the tale, they learned that this year is the Year of the Snake, symbolizing wisdom, intuition, and calm. The children were excited to take part in the celebrations, feeling connected to both the rich history and the vibrant customs of this joyful time.

The children got creative and made their very own big Chinese dragon, which they proudly paraded around. They worked together to craft the dragon, using vibrant materials and decorations, and took turns holding the dragon as they marched through the space. As they paraded, they listened to traditional Chinese music, which filled the air with rhythm and excitement. The children felt a deep sense of joy and connection to the culture as they danced and waved their dragon, making the celebration even more memorable and fun. It was a perfect way to bring the spirit of Chinese New Year to life, while honouring the rich traditions behind it.

This week the children have been learning all about Chinese New Year. They enjoyed listening to the story of The Great Race which explains the origins of Lunar New Year and finding out what their zodiac animal is depending on the date of their birthday. The children learned that this year is the year of the snake and they all designed a snake and had a go at describing it. In phonics, the children have been working hard to blend their sounds into words. They are making incredible progress and have really grown in confidence which is great to see.

In maths this week, the children have been learning about length and height. They built towers and compared them to see which is taller and which is shorter. They picked up and were able to use the vocabulary quickly and enjoyed comparing their own height with that of their friends.



Elephant Class have been learning...

Children's confidence in reading has noticeably improved, and they have been enthusiastic about taking home their Big Cat books, which cover a range of engaging topics. Similarly, for their RWI books, we encourage children to reread them at least three times: First, to ensure every word is read and pronounced correctly. Second, to read with increased speed and fluency. Third, to bring the text to life by reading in a storyteller's voice. We are also focusing on helping children practice breaking words into syllables to improve their decoding skills and reading stamina.

In **PSHE**, we have been focusing on teamwork skills. The children identified that good team members listen to one another, show effort, and share their ideas. They then practiced these skills in small groups by choosing one of three goals: learning to count to 10 in Mandarin, performing the Macarena, or reciting *The Owl and the Pussycat* by Edward Lear. The first challenge was agreeing on their group's goal. Through these activities, I observed improvements in the children's confidence and ability to negotiate and collaborate effectively.

In **Art**, the children have been designing and creating different patterns on a range of paper to use as backgrounds for their collages in Lesson 3. They carefully considered shape and line to create interesting and personalised paper. The children thoroughly enjoyed experimenting with a variety of techniques to make their work unique and expressive.

Panda Class have been learning...

Panda class pupils carefully threaded needles with wool in their DT lessons. Each child selected a piece of brightly coloured wool and carefully poked the end through the small eye of the needle, a task that required patience and precision. Once the needles were threaded, they started stitching the wool through the holes in the cardboard, creating simple patterns and designs. They displayed our core value Resilience when it got tricky. Well done for not giving up Panda Class!

In Maths, pupils used their number bonds to 10 to work out number bonds to 20. They began by recalling the pairs of numbers that added up to 10, such as 1+9, 2+8, and 5+5. Once they were confident with these, they applied their knowledge to find number bonds to 20. For example, they knew that if 5+5=10, then 5+15=20. By using their understanding of number bonds to 10, they were able to work out pairs like 12+8 and 17+3 with ease. The pupils have worked hard to solve problems and develop a deeper understanding of addition.

In PSHE we have been learning about having positive attitudes and how tackling a new challenge might stretch our learning. We were challenged to follow steps to achieve a goal of creating 'stretchy hand flowers' and each one of our flowers were unique, like every individual in Lion class.

We took this idea of stretching ourselves and applying it to our Art learning. Lion class learned a new skill of threading using a plastic needle and wool. It was challenging to put the wool through the eye of the needle, but we all persisted and overcame the challenge. When we overcome challenges, we feel "proud, excited and happy!"

In English we have been learning about the features and format of informal letters. We know letters consist of an address, date, content and the use of 'Dear' and 'From' to begin and end a letter. We have been planning our informal letters, thinking about who to write to and the content. Oral rehearsal of our letters have been important so that we can begin to write them. We look forward to delivering our letters to our chosen person very soon!


